Highlights from The Haifa International Film Festival

The 26th Haifa International Film Festival (HIFF) concluded one of its the most successful editions ever last week, with record braking attendance and a slate of highly anticipated world premieres.

The award in the Israeli feature film competition went to [MABUL](#) (*The Flood*), Guy Nattiv's drama about an autistic young man who returns to his family after being institutionalized for many years. The film stars Ronit Elkabetz, who was also honored at the festival with an achievement award for her contribution to Israeli cinema, and Michael Moshonov, who won an Ophir Award for his performance.

The Israel Film Center Distribution Award was presented to [JE T'AIME, I LOVE YOU TERMINAL](#), an enchanting romantic drama by director Dani Menkin.

The Other Israel Film Festival's Award was given to [THE HUMAN TURNBINE](#), a documentary by Danny Verete about a group of Israeli academics partnering with the Palestinian residents of Susia, a community of refugees and farmers near Hebron.



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The Hamptons International Film Festival

The Israel Film Center was on hand at this past weekend's Hamptons International Film Festival to co-present a screening of [PRECIOUS LIFE](#). The film was followed by a lively discussion with director Shlomi Eldar and Producer Ehud Bleiberg, who beautifully conveyed the central paradox at the heart of the film - that a single child's life can be deemed precious enough for Israelis and Palestinians to work tirelessly to save it (and at great expense), while at the same time acts of terrorism and military intervention pervade directly outside the hospital walls. The film will be presented as the closing night of the [Other Israel Film Festival](#) on November 18.

[MY SO CALLED ENEMY](#), Lisa Gossels' documentary account of a group of Israeli and Palestinian girls' lives in the aftermath of a life-changing encounter in a Peace Camp won the Brizzolara Family Conflict and Resolution Award. Julian Schnabel and Frieda Pinto were feted before a presentation of [MIRAL](#), which recreates the establishment of a real-life orphanage established by a Palestinian woman following the 1948 creation of the Israeli state. Also featured was the American remake of the 2007 Israeli thriller, [THE DEBT](#).



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Winners of the Israeli Film Academy Awards

Eran Riklis' [THE HUMAN RESOURCES MANAGER](#) won Best Feature at the Ophir Awards Ceremony which took place in Jerusalem, on September 21, 2010, and will be the film to represent Israel at the Academy Awards. The film won 5 Ophir Awards, for screenplay (Noah Stollman), soundtrack, Best Supporting Actress (Rosina Cambos) and Best Director.

The award for Best Documentary went to Shlomi Eldar for his

film [PRECIOUS LIFE](#).

Maya Dagan won the award for Best Actress for her performance as Clara, the alluring yet emotionally fragile Holocaust survivor in Avi Nesher's [THE MATCHMAKER](#)(AKA Once I Was). The film's lead actor Adir Miller won the award for Best Actor for his roll in the film.

Michael Moshonov won the award for Best Supporting Actor for his role in [MABUL](#)(The Flood), directed by Guy Nativ.

Amnon Salomon won the award for Best Cinematography for [INFILTRATION](#), directed by Dover Kosashvili.
